PROPOSAL TO CHANGE THE TRANSCRIPT-RECOGNIZED BUSINESS AND PUBLIC POLICY CERTIFICATE IN THE RED MCCOMBS SCHOOL OF BUSINESS CHAPTER IN THE UNDERGRADUATE CATALOG, 2016-2018

Dean Thomas W. Gilligan, in the Red McCombs School of Business has filed with the secretary of the Faculty Council the following changes to the *Undergraduate Catalog*, 2016-2018. On January 30, 2015, the Undergraduate Program Committee approved the proposal, and the faculty representatives from all of the school's departments and programs approved it on April 16, 2015. The secretary has classified this proposal as legislation of *general* interest to more than one college or school.

The Committee on Undergraduate Degree Program Review recommended approval of the changes of the certificate on October 7, 2015, and forwarded the proposal to the Office of the General Faculty. The Faculty Council has the authority to approve this legislation on behalf of the General Faculty. The authority to grant final approval on this legislation resides with UT System.

If no objection is filed with the Office of the General Faculty by the date specified below, the legislation will be held to have been approved by the Faculty Council. If an objection is filed within the prescribed period, the legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council at its next meeting. The objection, with reasons, must be signed by a member of the Faculty Council.

To be counted, a protest must be received in the Office of the General Faculty by October 22, 2015.

12. Other Certificate Requirements: Add requirement that students must satisfy the courses used to fulfill certificate requirements on the letter-grade basis, and maintain a grade point average of at least 2.00 in these courses.

13. Give a Detailed Rationale for Change(s):

- 1. Add BGS 374 to the selection list of required courses.
 - Rationale: BGS 374 was recently created and is available due to newly hired BGS faculty. Class topic and content is specifically appropriate for the BPP Certificate.
- 2. Amend required courses to be a selection list of at least three of the four. Rationale: With the addition of BGS 374, students can have more flexibility with the required classes and can take three of the four (BGS 371, 372, 373, 374).
- 3. Add BGS 325 as an elective option.
 - Rationale: Course content is appropriate for the BPP Certificate.
- 4. Correct Finance 372 Advanced Topics in Finance to FIN 372.1 Environmental, Social & Governance Investing.
 - Rationale: Course was originally proposed in certificate as "Finance 372 Environmental, Social & Governance Investing." Unfortunately the topic number was not included, so in the catalog was reverted to the generic base topics course, which was not the certificate intention. The correct topic course and number are being re-specified.
- 5. Correct Government 360N *Topics in International Relations* to GOV 360N.13, *Global Governance*. Rationale: Course was originally proposed in certificate as "GOV 360N *Global Governance*." Now that topic has its own number, so the generic topics course currently listed and which was not the certificate intention, is being specified to the correct topic number and title.

6. Correct Government 365N *Topics in Comparative Politics* to GOV 365N.17, *Issues in Third World Development*.

Rationale: Course was originally proposed in certificate as "GOV 365N *Issues in Third World Development*." Now that topic has its own number, so the generic topics course currently listed and which was not the certificate intention, is being specified to the correct topic number and title.

7. Add requirement that certificate courses be taken on the letter-grade basis, and that a GPA of 2.00 must be achieved.

Rationale: These requirements were mistakenly thought to be in place for all the University certificate requirements; since learning that is not so, they are being added explicitly to the business school's certificate requirements to maintain appropriate academic standards.
