## PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE AMERICAN STUDIES DEGREE PROGRAM IN THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS CHAPTER IN THE UNDERGRADUATE CATALOG, 2016-2018

Dean Randy L. Diehl, in the College of Liberal Arts has filed with the secretary of the Faculty Council the following changes to the Undergraduate Catalog, 2016-2018. On March 31, 2015, the Department of American Studies Faculty Committee approved the proposed changes. On May 5, 2015, the College of Liberal Arts Policy and Curriculum Committee approved them, and on May 25, 2015, the dean and the College of Liberal Arts faculty approved the legislation. The secretary has classified this proposal as legislation of exclusive interest to only one college or school.

The Committee on Undergraduate Degree Program Review recommended approval of the minor on November 4,2015 , and forwarded the proposal to the Office of the General Faculty. The Faculty Council has the authority to approve this legislation on behalf of the General Faculty. The authority to grant final approval on this legislation resides with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

If no objection is filed with the Office of the General Faculty by the date specified below, the legislation will be held to have been approved by the Faculty Council. If an objection is filed within the prescribed period, the legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council at its next meeting. The objection, with reasons, must be signed by a member of the Faculty Council.

To be counted, a protest must be received in the Office of the General Faculty by November 18, 2015.

2. EXPLAIN CHANGE TO DEGREE PROGRAM AND GIVE A DETAILED RATIONALE FOR EACH INDIVIDUAL CHANGE:
Under proposed changes, twenty-seven semester hours would be required for the AMS major, an increase from twenty-four hours required under the 2014-16 catalog. The change is designed to strengthen the major and forge a stronger connection between undergraduate students and the department and faculty. The additional hours would be an AMS elective which will provide some added flexibility in a degree plan that is relatively prescriptive. Even with the addition of three semester hours, the total number of required hours remains less than many other COLA majors, particularly since several major courses also fulfill core and COLA degree requirements. AMS does not anticipate the change having a significant impact on the number of students in the major.

The minor requirement was eliminated under the assumption that all Liberal Arts students in the 2016-18 catalog will need to complete a Transcript-recognized minor (TRM) or certificate program.

Yes If yes, explain: Forty-five hours total required (previously thirty-nine hours, with twelve-hour minor requirement). Rationale: The elimination of the minor requirement (see first proposed change) meant that IRG needed to insert additional hours into its major requirements if it wished to preserve core area-studies coursework for students. The forty-five hours total (major only) represents a decrease from the fiftyone hours total (major + minor) in previous catalogs, but still considerably more than other COLA degree programs.

## AMERICAN STUDIES

Major
[Twenty fomr Twenty-seven semester hours of coursework in American studies, including at least fifteen hours of upper-division coursework. The following courses are required:

1. American Studies 310, Introduction to American Studies
2. American Studies 311S, Introductory Seminar in American Studies
3. American Studies 355, Main Currents of American Culture to 1865 and American Studies 356, Main Currents of American Culture since 1865
4. Nine semester hours chosen from topics of American Studies 370, Seminar in American Culture
5. [Three] Six additional semester hours of American studies coursework
[Minor for American Studies Majors]
[Twelve semester hours, including at least six hours of upper-division coursework, in any one other field of study in the University. Six of the required twelve semester hours must be taken in residence.]
