**PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE DOCTOR OF PHARMACY DEGREE PROGRAM IN THE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY CHAPTER IN THE *UNDERGRADUATE CATALOG 2016-2018***

Dean M. Lynn Crismon in the College of Pharmacy has filed with the secretary of the Faculty Council the following changes to the *Undergraduate Catalog, 2016-2018*. The secretary has classified this proposal as legislation of *general* interest to more than one college or school.

The Committee on Undergraduate Degree Program Review recommended approval of the minor on January 21, 2016, and forwarded the proposal to the Office of the General Faculty. The Faculty Council has the authority to approve this legislation on behalf of the General Faculty. The authority to grant final approval on this legislation resides with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

If no objection is filed with the Office of the General Faculty by the date specified below, the legislation will be held to have been approved by the Faculty Council. If an objection is filed within the prescribed period, the legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council at its next meeting. The objection, with reasons, must be signed by a member of the Faculty Council.

To be counted, a protest must be received in the Office of the General Faculty by February 14, 2016.

- Pharmacology Principles (PHR 153M)

Will be integrated to create a two-semester sequence:

- Physiology/Pathophysiology I (PHR 480C)
- Physiology/Pathophysiology II (PHR 480D)

The rationale for this change is that the previous four courses represented a disjointed approach to providing the normal (physiology), abnormal (pathophysiology), and drug-targeting foundation for our extensive pharmacotherapeutics sequence later in the curriculum. Based on highly successful integration of content across pharmacy sub-disciplines in that very pharmacotherapeutics sequence, we will now have a foundational sequence that integrates the normal physiology, pathophysiology, functional anatomy, and an introduction to 'drug-targeting' based on disease state management. There is no net change in semester credit hours with this change (8 SCH total), although it does shift one hour back from the spring semester to the fall semester.
