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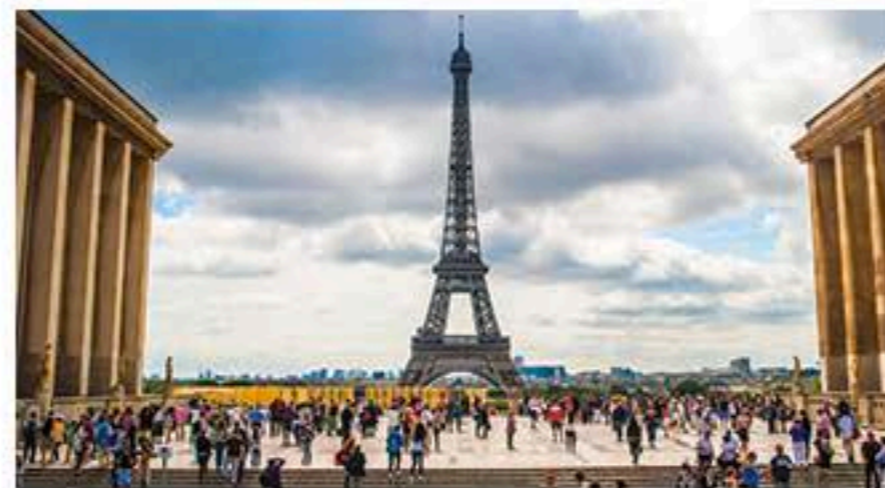

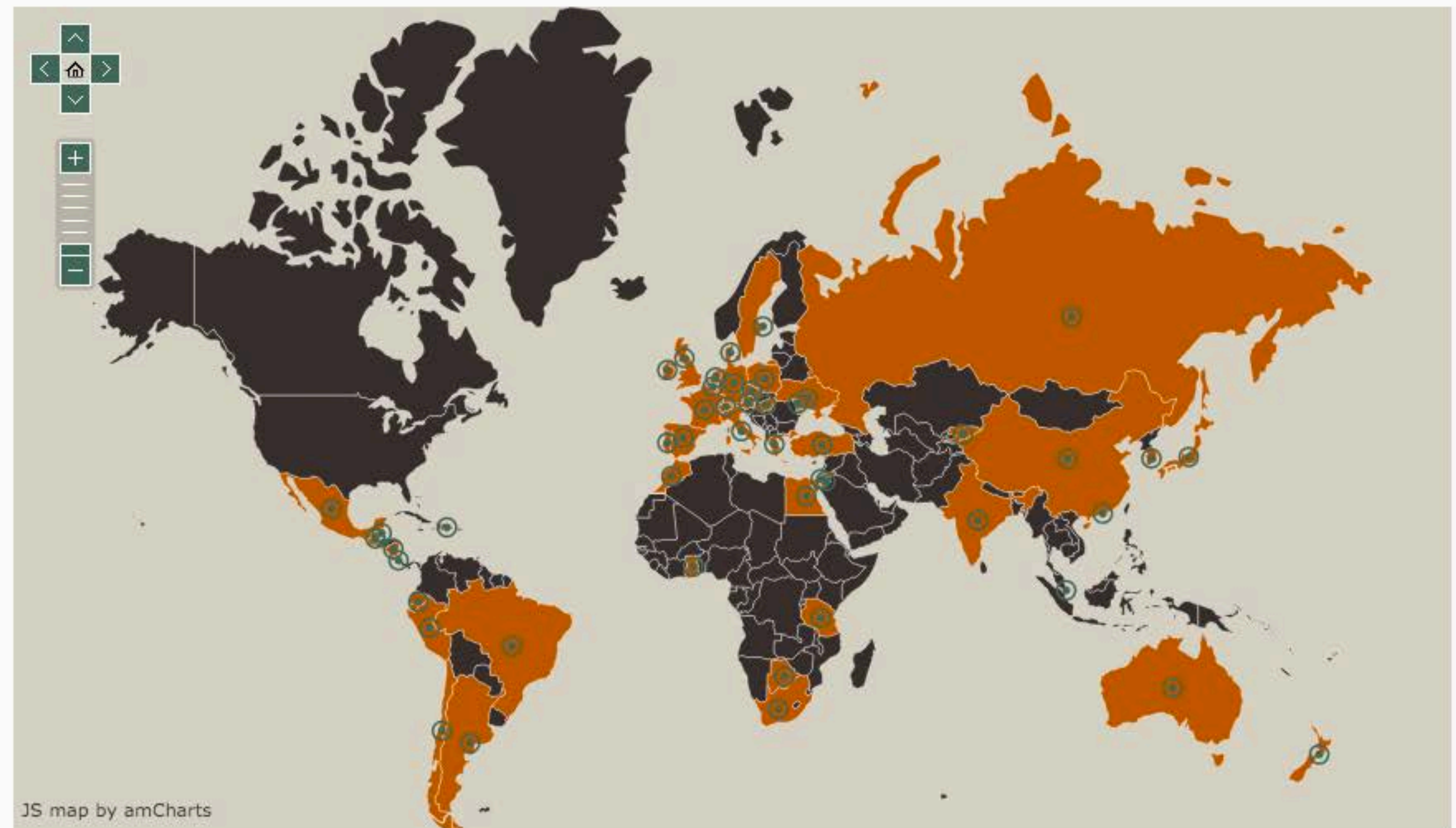

International Independent Study & Research

Graduate students at The University of Texas at Austin may register for **International Independent Study and Research** (ISR) if they are conducting research or studying independently abroad.

The student must submit an application for ISR to **study abroad** and must complete all requirements for application in accordance with the following deadlines:

- Fall – Aug. 1
- Spring – Dec. 1
- Summer – May 1

Enrollment requires the approval of the student's faculty sponsor, the program graduate adviser and Study Abroad. The approval may cover up to four consecutive long-session semesters.

Students enrolled in Independent Study and Research are considered **full-time students**. When it is determined that a doctoral candidate is eligible for International Independent Study and Research, their registration in ISR satisfies the **continuous registration** requirement for doctoral students in candidacy. Students may not register for ISR during their final semester.

International Exchange (UT-Pharmobility)

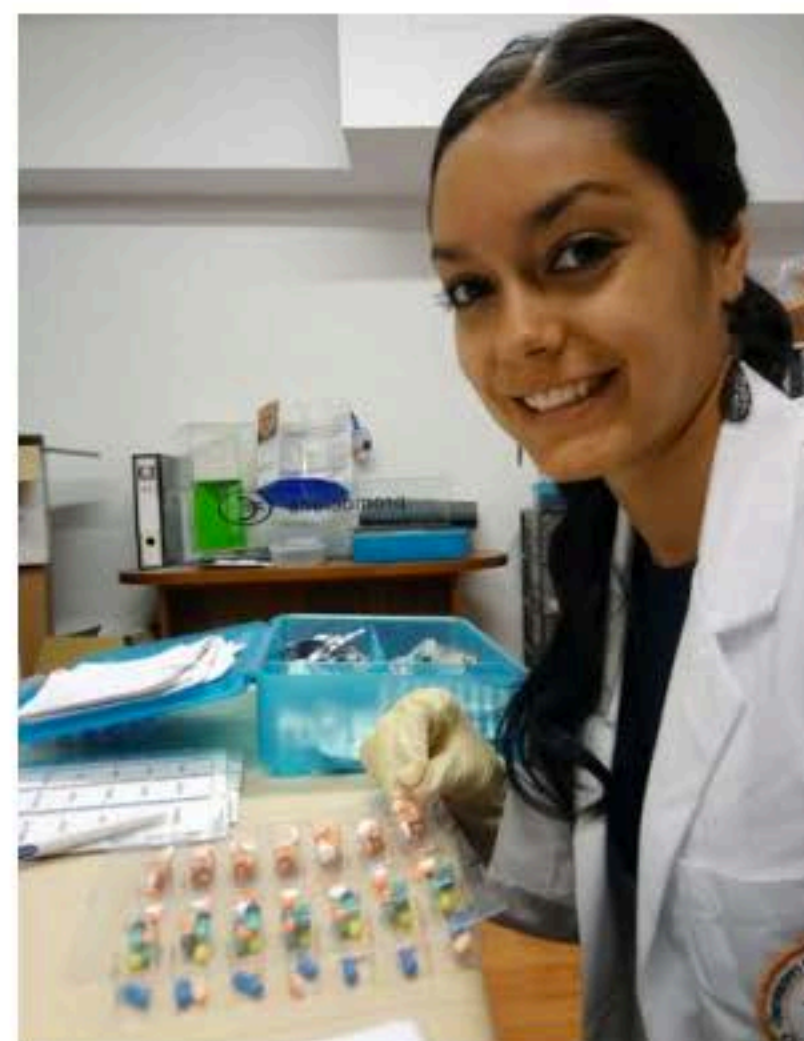
Who? What? Where?

Who is the UT-Pharmobility Program for?

- Opportunity for international exchange of pharmacy students (US <-> Europe or Japan) to enhance cooperation and understanding of the similarities and differences in pharmacy education, research, and practice.
- Opportunity for our P4 students to study abroad for a summer APPE rotation in a structured program designed to enhance student development and meet the student's specific professional (pharmacy) interests.
- International education through exchange programs is now a major emphasis of the University.

What are the experiences provided by the Pharmobility Partners?

- **Bath University, England.** The program at Bath coordinated by Dr. Andrew Thompson includes a variety of experiences in pharmacy practice, including community, hospital, and industrial. Typically the student will spend ~1 week in each setting that is arranged between the student and the sponsor. The UK government also has a requirement that of the experience be on campus with a faculty sponsor to conduct a project. This is typically a comparison of practices between the UK and the US.
- **University of Barcelona, Spain.** Students participating with Barcelona coordinated by Dr. Cecilia Fernandez-Lastra, typically chose a single setting for their experience (e.g., hospital practice). Supplementary components (e.g. national practice governance) can be arranged as well. A basic level of fluency in Spanish is required.
- **University of Lisbon, Portugal.** The program at Lisbon coordinated by Dr. Joao Pinto typically includes a variety of experiences in hospital or community practice, or the pharmaceutical industry. Students will arrange the particular with the sponsor. A basic level of fluency in Spanish or Portuguese is required.



Where are the exchanges?

European partners are Bath/UK, Lisbon/Portugal, and Barcelona/Spain. Each of these Universities also sends us their students during the academic year on this official reciprocal exchange program. We continue to work with other international universities and UT's International Office to add additional exchanges (a lengthy process).

Program Details



How is the Program funded?

College Special Funding from the Matthew's Endowment Travel Stipends at \$1,500 to support your travel (provided before departure). Generally, each of our exchange students will be funded with this stipend (but it is contingent on number of students participating and availability).

- University funding through travel scholarships (you apply; see the [C-GEO website](#). See the 'funding' tab)
- Loans (since you are a registered student, you are eligible for financial aid).
- Additional Personal funds (loans, savings, etc).
- Most students report a total cost of \$3,000-\$5,000 for the experience.

What is my student status while traveling?

Students in the Pharmobility Program must be officially enrolled

at the University of Texas. This is accomplished for our P4 students by registering for your first (elective) APPE to cover the summer they are abroad. Students must be in good academic standing to participate.

When would I go during the upcoming program year?

- P4 (current P3's): Summer of your P4 year (Sum-2017). This counts as your first rotation (elective). Plan ahead!
- You are registered as UT students, not registered at the host institution.
- University arrangements for the PHARMOBILITY Program (once you are selected) are now made through the International Office.

Applying for the Program & Completing the Program

How do I apply? What happens then?

- It is important that you complete and submit the [application electronically \(pdf\)](#). Email the completed form to (patrick.davis@austin.utexas.edu).
- **DEADLINE for the 2017 Exchange Monday, January 2nd, 2017.**
- Fill out completely but be judicious with your info; don't just say 'my C.V. is attached' e.g. ASHP membership may be crucial if you want to see how hospital pharmacy is practiced in Spain. Having been in 4H in high school is probably not relevant.
- Be as complete and specific as possible as to the type of experience you want to have and how it will impact your future practice. Please do not contact our Pharmobility partners at this point as they find it confusing (they don't know if you have been selected for the program or not). If you need University-specific info, see Dr. Davis.
- We and our Exchange Partners will review all applications. If you are "Approved To Proceed..." you will be notified by Dr. Davis.
- Coordinators (my counterparts) at European/Japan contact students and help you start making appropriate arrangements).
- Language proficiency (if relevant) validated. At that point the student commits to participate.
- International paperwork (e.g. visa and all UT requirements) is started and completed through the International Office.
- Final assessment of language skills (if necessary) to ensure a sufficient level of fluency.

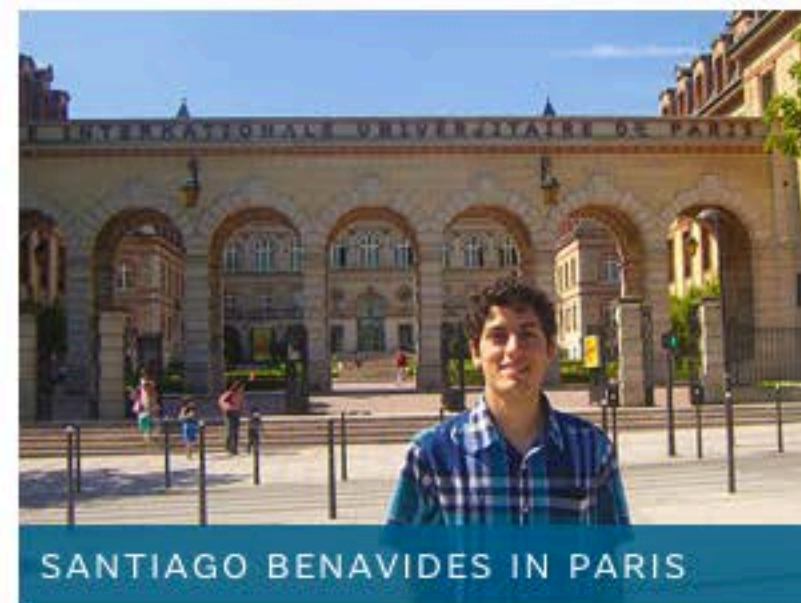

International and Study Abroad Programs

The School of Law is proud to offer many international programs to Texas Law's J.D. students.

In accordance with paragraph I.A.3 of the American Bar Association's *Criteria for Student Study at a Foreign Institution*, the University of Texas at Austin School of Law sets forth the following objectives for students studying abroad and receiving JD credit:

The University Of Texas School of Law recognizes the value of an international component to legal education. As the world becomes increasingly interconnected very few legal issues are exclusively domestic. Exposure to different legal systems equips student with the skills they need to recognize and handle the complexity of international legal issues. Further, exposure to foreign cultures and languages deepens students' personal development and trains lawyers who are better able to handle clients of all backgrounds, in addition, law students deepen their understanding of United States by comparing it to different legal systems.

Semester Abroad Programs

Students can travel all over the world to learn about foreign legal systems, gain specialized expertise in areas of law while attending prestigious law schools. Texas Law students may attend English instruction or after providing language proficiency may study in a foreign language. Students will spend the fall semester of their 3L year abroad. Students will receive credit toward their J.D. upon successfully completing courses abroad and submitting foreign credit to the Graduate & International Programs office for credit conversion toward their University of Texas School of Law J.D. degree.

Academics

JACKSON SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The Jackson Scholars program is a learning initiative designed to foster achievement, initiative and motivation academically and in the community. A goal of the Jackson School is to promote "scholars" in the broadest sense where a scholar is defined not solely by classroom performance but also by a willingness to take initiative and participate in research, governance, professional development, study abroad, and/or community service

General Requirements

Prospective Jackson Scholars register for the program during their freshman, sophomore, or junior year. Applications are available online and should be turned in to the JSG Student Services Office in JGB 2.102. Each student must:

- Remain in good academic standing at UT Austin
- Be continuously enrolled in a JSG degree program for a minimum of 12 hours each long semester
- Graduate with a minimum cumulative and major GPA of 3.0.
- Submit a completed Jackson Scholars portfolio for review during their last semester, prior to graduation. A complete portfolio must include, at a minimum:
 - Completed approval forms for all activities
 - Documentation for two of the three possible areas in Category I: Scholarship
 - Documentation for one of two areas in Category II: Service

The requirements for Jackson Scholar can be completed at any time during the student's program, but will only be recognized at graduation, and only the final GPA(s) will be evaluated.

In order to receive credit for scholarship and service activities, a petition must be approved before beginning work in these areas. Each component requires adequate and appropriate documentation that must be included in the final Jackson Scholars Portfolio. Meetings and workshops are held throughout the year to provide additional information and resources to help students plan and fulfill program requirements.

Category I: Scholarship

Research

The research element involves organized laboratory, literature, or field research, supervised by a faculty member in the Jackson School, which results in a written project report or publication. The research project is to be carried out over a minimum of 2 semesters, and involves a defined research question, a brief proposal, and a final written project report. The student must register for GEO 379K or 371C for at least one semester, preferably the second when the research project is completed. Honors students approved to submit their thesis work as part of their Jackson Scholars portfolio may count GEO 379H. The project report format is open, but must be agreed upon by the student and supervisor. Proposals for non-traditional research projects may be submitted to the JSG Student Services Office for consideration by the JSG Undergraduate Committee. Research projects completed for the JSG Honors program that lead to successful completion of a thesis may be counted as one component of Category I. Honors students must submit a petition to count their thesis towards the Jackson Scholars program prior to starting work on the project. A final version of the written project report or publication must be included in the portfolio.

Study Abroad

A study abroad program is a rewarding but challenging experience. To be included in the Jackson Scholar Portfolio a student must participate in one of UT's recognized study abroad programs for a full semester and be enrolled in the host University. 'Maymester' and Faculty-Led summer programs do not count toward Jackson Scholar recognition. To participate in a semester abroad program a student must be in good standing and have a minimum UT and GEO cumulative GPA of 3.0. Courses taken at the host university must be for credit with a grade of C or better, and the course credit must be recognized either by direct course equivalency or as 319S or 329S. The student must include in their Jackson Scholar portfolio documentation from UT and the host university of successful completion.

Category I: Scholarship

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Students interested in participating in UT Study Abroad are strongly encouraged to meet with a Jackson School Academic Advisor to discuss their goal as early as possible. There are currently 8-9 study abroad programs in geological sciences, in as many countries, which offer exciting programs for JSG students. The experience that works best with a student's academic goals, degree progress, and area of interest may require planning three to four semesters in advance.

Internship

Internships are a valuable way to gain work experience and training directly applicable to the student's area of future employment. To be recognized as a core element for a Jackson Scholar the internship must be a minimum of two consecutive summer sessions (ex. f and s) or one long-session semester (fall or spring) in a supervised internship program, and the student must be enrolled in GEO 679J or 679G. At the conclusion of the internship the student must prepare a report of accomplishments and advances made during the internship, and secure a letter of evaluation from the internship supervisor for inclusion in the JS portfolio. To register for an internship the student must be in good academic standing and have a minimum cumulative UT and GEO GPA of 3.0.

Category II: Service

Community and Professional Service

A fundamental part of being an effective geoscientist is participation in the broader aspects of the profession and the society in general through volunteering and service learning. Community and professional service could take the form of volunteer community service such as volunteer EMS, community hotline, or volunteering in schools or hospitals. A variety of volunteer opportunities are available through [UT Volunteer and Service Learning Center](#). This is intended to be a major investment on the part of the student that leads toward a long-term commitment to service. Active Membership in a volunteer organization for at least one year is required for Jackson Scholars. Supporting material for the JS portfolio should include a support letter from the organization's leadership and a log of service hours. Organizations must be approved prior to beginning service.

Leadership

A Jackson Scholar is expected to be a leader in the field of Earth Sciences, and an active member of their professional community. A Leadership component, for inclusion in the JS portfolio, could include elected positions in student organizations or clubs (not restricted to geosciences organizations), participation in City, County, or State legislative affairs, a leadership role (elected or promotion based) in a volunteer organization. Supporting material for the JS portfolio should include a support letter from the organization and a log of service hours or list of leadership duties.

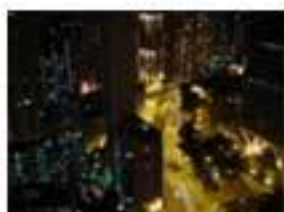

Study Abroad

The School of Architecture encourages first-hand experiences of diverse peoples, places and cultures - nationally and internationally - so that we might better engage the world in which we live. Educational travel experiences can be integrated into degree plans in several ways, including, but not limited to, the following:

Study in Italy is a semester at the Santa Chiara Study Center in Tuscany, approximately an hour from Florence. The program allows for an intensive study of design, history, and visual communication, while the Center's historic structure provides a congenial campus environment and a base for travel throughout Italy. Europe Program is a semester of study that emphasizes a broad and integrated experience covering the buildings and landscapes as well as the urban fabric across Europe. Studio Mexico explores the rich cultural and built environment of Mexico. It involves a nine day trip to Mexico visiting the site of the design project as well as other places of significance. Students participating in this studio are required to take the class Mexican Architecture and Urbanism offered every spring. The class can be taken concurrently with Studio Mexico or during the previous spring semester. Studio Mexico is offered every other spring.

Studio Madrid | Austin is an urban design studio that involves a nine day trip to Spain. The focus of the studio is to learn through traveling, design and research about the Compact City model that Madrid represents, contrast it with the Landscape City model of Austin and develop higher density urban design strategies for the city of Austin. This studio will be offered every other spring.

Summer Faculty-led Programs are six to nine-week study abroad programs led by one or more UT faculty members. Some programs are administered by the Study Abroad Office (SAO) while others are administered by a college or department. The UTSOA currently offers the following faculty-led summer program:

- **Sustainable Architecture and Design in Munich** offers two integrated seminars on sustainable architecture and design, developing insight into the principles of high-comfort/low-energy architecture. The courses present examples of sustainable design on both theoretical and applied levels through case studies, field trips, and lectures.

Maymester Abroad programs are short-term study abroad programs that last four weeks in duration. Students take an intensive three or four credit UT course adapted to incorporate on-site learning such as company visits, guest lectures, and academic field trips. Maymester Abroad programs are considered part of the spring semester but begin in late May after completion of spring coursework.

The challenges in fulfilling degree requirements are myriad, including such issues as personal motivation, developing a passion for research and a clear research trajectory, being well organized, avoiding or managing health, financial or relationship problems, and maintaining positive momentum and speed throughout the program. Various graduate deans, dissertation advisors and former doctoral students address such issues; see <https://webspace.utexas.edu/cherwitz/www/ie/disslist.html>, which is available through the School of Information Doctoral of Philosophy program site (under "Dissertation Proposal and Defense"): <http://www.ischool.utexas.edu/programs/phd.php>.

Nevertheless, this Section addresses some of the key points about coordinating with the UT Graduate School and other UT units, including the School of Information, to fulfill degree requirements. For the most part, the Graduate School's requirements and those of other UT "parent" units provide a framework for (and take precedence over) School of Information degree requirements. Accordingly, this Section also addresses working, as appropriate, with several UT units, including the Graduate & International Admissions Center (GIAC), Registrar, International Office, Dean of Students, and Institutional Review Board (IRB) of the Office of Research Support and Compliance.

General degree requirements for the Doctor of Philosophy are summarized in the *Graduate Catalog*: <http://catalog.utexas.edu/graduate/degree-requirements/doctor-of-philosophy/> Requirements stated in the *Graduate Catalog* supersede information issued by the School of Information and other schools and departments. School of Information degree requirements elaborate on *Graduate Catalog* requirements and (as stated earlier) are summarized at: <http://www.ischool.utexas.edu/programs/phd.php>. In developing your Plan of Study, it is useful to articulate these two sets of requirements to provide your own general framework. It is generally advisable to continually consult the Graduate School web site for updates on travel scholarships, application deadlines, and so on.

The following subsections briefly discuss how to coordinate your efforts with the Graduate School and other UT units. No attempt is made here to duplicate the information provided by the Graduate School and these other units. Instead, the following paragraphs point out a few critical tasks and refer you to basic sources of information.

Models for Student Participation

Here are some ways that undergraduates typically participate in research.

Individual Project

Individual research includes theses, independent studies, honors projects, and creative projects. This model of research allows students to create a product that reflects their unique interests, as well as their passion and commitment to learning.

Assistance on a Research Project

Serving as a research assistant involves working with a faculty member or graduate student on an existing research project. Such an experience provides students with valuable training in how to conduct research. As a research assistant, they typically assist with a project rather than conduct their own study. It is not uncommon for graduate students to take a large role in supervising an undergraduate research assistant.

Study Abroad Program with a Research Component

Study abroad can provide excellent opportunities for students to pursue research and gain cross-cultural skills and experiences. The [Study Abroad Office](#) helps make international learning experiences available to every student. Depending on the study abroad program, students may need or want a UT-affiliated faculty mentor, in addition to supervising faculty at the research site.

Developing Civil Society Education via Case Studies: A North American Perspective

The Developing Civil Society via Case Studies (DCSCS) program offers students an opportunity to study abroad in Canada, Mexico or the U.S. and to receive academic credit for researching and developing management case studies of local civil society organizations.

The program includes academic theory, discussions of the cultural underpinnings of civil society and essential nonprofit management skills. Students are expected to work within small student teams and collaboratively with the leaders of local civil society organizations to examine and analyze a crisis or management challenge that the organization faces.

At the end of the program, consortium faculty members select the strongest cases for publication opportunities including submission to the Electronic Hallway, a preeminent source of teaching cases and curriculum at the University of Washington's Evans School of Public Affairs. Any case studies submitted for electronic or print publication follow a standard case format and recognize the faculty members, student researchers, and the respective government sponsors.

The Program Coordinator at your home institution can provide application materials, course information and assist with study abroad logistics.
