REQUEST TO ADD AN IBERO-AMERICAN CULTURAL DIVERSITY CERTIFICATE IN THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS CHAPTER IN THE UNDERGRADUATE CATALOG 2018-2020

Dean Randy Diehl in the College of Liberal Arts has filed with the Secretary of the Faculty Council the following proposal to create an Ibero-American Cultural Diversity Certificate in the College of Liberal Arts chapter in the *Undergraduate Catalog*, 2018-2020. The Iberian and Latin American Languages and Cultures Faculty approved the proposal on March 31, 2017; the College Curriculum Design and Assessment Committee approved it on May 3, 2017, and the Dean and the College faculty approved it on June 5, 2017. The Secretary has classified this proposal as legislation of exclusive interest to one college or school.

The Committee on Undergraduate Degree Program Review recommended approval of the proposal on December 5, 2017, and forwarded it to the Office of the General Faculty. The Faculty Council has the authority to approve this legislation on behalf of the General Faculty. The authority to grant final approval on this legislation resides with the Provost on behalf of the President.

If no objection is filed with the Office of the General Faculty by the date specified below, the legislation will be held to have been approved by the Faculty Council. If an objection is filed within the prescribed period, the legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council at its next meeting. The objection, with reasons, must be signed by a member of the Faculty Council.

To be counted, a protest must be received in the Office of the General Faculty by December 12, 2017.

The Certificate in Certificate Ibero-American Cultural Diversity is designed for students who wish to study a complex range of issues related to cultural contact, ethnicity, identity, and globalism in the Iberian and Latin American worlds, both historically and in contemporary contexts. The foundation of the program consists of nine hours of courses taught in English on Iberian and Latin American Cultures in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese, and incorporates nine additional hours of study in related programs such as African and African Diaspora Studies, Native American and Indigenous Studies, and Latin American Studies.

13. GIVE A DETAILED RATIONALE FOR CHANGE(S):

The proposed certificate program incorporates content courses on the upper-division level that are taught in English on a variety of topics related to issues of diversity and global contact within the field of Iberian and Latin American Studies. With this program, we hope to address the needs of a student population that does not traditionally major in our field, but maintains an active interest in Iberian and Latin American cultural

studies. Since there is no language proficiency requirement for the courses offered in this program, we anticipate the certificate will be an attractive option for students who major in related fields, such as International Relations and Global Studies, History, Anthropology, and Latin American Studies.
